

Knitting in the round with double pointed needles.

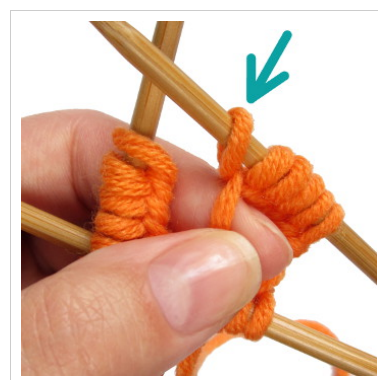
Double pointed needles usually come in a set of five and are great for knitting small items like socks, gloves or clothes for toys.



1. Cast on the required number of stitches plus one (in this example 15+1 stitches).



2. Divide them on to three or four double pointed needles.



3. Pick up the work so the working yarn is on the right and behind the work.



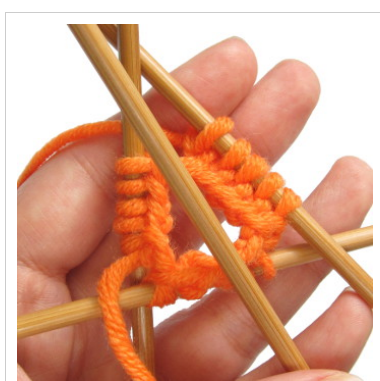
4. Slip the last stitch on the third needle (on the right) on to the first needle (on the left).



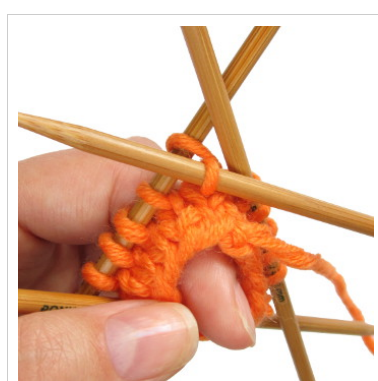
5. Take a free needle and knit the first two stitches together, joining the round.



6. Continue knitting, transferring all the stitches on the first needle on to the free needle.



7. Now you have a new free needle. Use it to knit the stitches on the second needle.



8. Continue knitting around the outside of your work.



9. Yarn tail marks the end of the round. You can also use a stitch marker.
